A spade came next, ruffed with the $\Im 3$, the $\Im \Omega \Omega$ falling from East. Then the $\Im \Omega \Omega$ falling from East and diamond was ruffed small and another spade was ruffed with the $\Im \Omega \Omega$ and over ruffed by East with the $\Im \Omega \Omega$ East produced the thirteenth diamond and declarer, with bated breath, put in the $\Im \Omega$ home and dry!

At the other table the Spaniards reached 3N.T. - hardly, one would have thought, the par contract on such a distribution! The Austrian East led a low heart won by declarer's Ace. A small club to the queen and a low one back to the eight was taken by East's \$10. East, Hartwich, now played one of the only two cards to beat the contract - a spade. In fact he led the ten which took dummy's knave and West's ace. If West, Meindl, had been with it, he'd have returned the \$3 and Hartwich would have put the lead into dummy with his last club. Alas, deceived perhaps by the \$\times A\$ at trick l, he led another heart, and declarer came to three hearts, two diamonds, and four clubs. Only 11 IMPs to Austria for the slam bonus.

North (Ireland in the Open Room) called 18 or pass. The Tournament Director was summoned and on the evidence of the recorder ruled that North had passed. The bidding reverted to South who was told that she could make any bid she liked, but her partner would have to pass on the next round. South bid 3N.T. and was two down, minus 200. The Irish captain appealed that the Tournament Director should have ruled that her North player had bid 10 out of turn and that her partner should have been silent throughout.

The Appeal Committee ruled that the Tournament Director's decision was correct, that North had passed and that South's bid of 3N.T. on a count of ten points was made at her own risk. The board stands as played. Ireland losing 200 points in the room.

On the bidding it is clear that North will be played for three spades and that the QJ is a singleton. Declarer is known to hold a singleton diamond and no better than a doubleton club. It is fair to assume that he has the QK. In fact he actually held:

\$\text{Q} A K 9 8 7 6\$ If this is the case, he will need two entries to dummy, one to lead towards the VK and a second to finesse the \$\text{Q}\$9, and \$\text{Q}\$4 North should avoid doing either of these things for him. In practice North led the VA and continued with a second heart, and declarer thereafter had no problem, being able to ruff the second club, discard a heart or a top diamond and take the spade finesse. Another club from North puts paid to the contract, leaving declarer an entry short to dummy.

THOUGHTS ON FUTURE CHAMPIONSHIPS - Nico D. Oudshoorn.

Present tournaments cost such an enormous amount of money that the smaller countries are unable to stage them unless they are lucky enough to find sponsors. Even the cheapest way of running such an event will cost the equivalent of £ 12,000.

One of the most costly items are expenses for the staff when these have to be brought in from outside. This has had the full attention of the Executive and Tournament Committees and, as a result, certain measures have been tried out to cut down the number of assistants. In Deauville, for example, we did entirely without the table scorers, but this proved to be too hard on the players. A variation of this system has been tried here in Oslo, the addition of a recording room, so that the players' only task is to fill in the bidding panels.

The lack of training of the volunteers in the Open Room has resulted in many mistakes, another contributing factor being that there has been no common standard laid down as to how the panels should be filled in (e.g.;D' for "Double"). It would be an improvement if each team were allowed two assistants, who need not receive payment but who should receive badges and be permitted to take part in official recreational events. These assistants should receive some instruction. In the Closed Room, of course, the players have to do without such help, and the handling of the sheets and of the plastic folders is, to my mind, too big a load on them. I would therefore, suggest that for the Closed Room we should return to our old method, small bidding slips which would go along with the board to the recording room, and the, details would be entered by the recorders who, after all, have fully four hours and twenty minutes to enter 32 deals, and could easily be in charge of filling in the Closed Room bidding panels.

A LITTLE BIRD TELLS US..... that having defended down to the last few tricks, our Rixi let it be known that she could now place the rest of her partner's and declarer's cards. She made the killing lead - and Squitzi was freezed!
